



VIEWS FROM OUR FOUNDER AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Though overall in 2018 it felt reactionary, I'm pleased that more whites are open to "talk and listen" candidly about race and racism. The same can be said about blacks talking about class disparities. I trust that more of the people and institutions we engage with realize the liberty and influence they receive from visiting both subject through education as presented by African American Registry.

We started 2018 by exceeding expectations from the legislature and the Minnesota Department of Education of our January assessment. Our new responsive website design with weekly content additions and growing insertions of educator support remains ahead of the demands of technology as information literacy moves forward.


18 years earlier one of the first articles placed in our database was the story of Aesop, which brings to mind his fable "the tortoise and the hare" and its philosophical influence on our work. We measure our classroom service and youth programs with an honest agenda of publishing information. This pace challenges our visitors to enlighten themselves through our education and technology. As you know, the tortoise meticulously won the race with patience. Teaching also can take more time to fulfill than most practices. This applies to reclaiming the information and data about our place in the world's story as Africans in the Americas.

My 2018 invitation and trip to speak in Brazil at the 5th Annual Conference on Racial and Ethnic Inequality was a rewarding experience with a carryover into my coming years. It felt like a homecoming of sorts in part because of the account of the middle passage. The former slaves the Quilombo community are still there and over 50% of all Brazilian people are of African descent.

It feels like our work is being called to a birthright level that connects us deeper to our history. We've established an international relationship with the University of Minnesota's Humphrey Institute and the International Leadership Institute (ILI). If future opportunities arise there, the goal in Brazil will be to learn from them and use our content and pedagogy to edify.

Our translation capability is paying added dividends to intersect globally. We are a methodical international force for curriculum reform with purpose. Visitors from over 125 countries and territories continue to teach, learn and motivate with our method and content.

THE HEALING POWER OF CURRICULUM REFORM!

One of the sad realities of American racism is how communities of privilege successfully control its narrative. Allowing alteration, neglect and scantiness of the truths of black people, locations or episodes protect this control.

African American Registry® speaks truth to power, we serve learners from age 5 to 95 everywhere; classrooms, homes, desktops, laptops, all mobile devices (tablets, phones) and community learning environments.

Intersectionality is a unique and powerful teaching and learning method we use. It is especially effective with culturally intended syllabuses, ours is a classic example. You see controlling our stories allows ALL of African America to disarm racism simultaneously while educating ALL students. Another part of telling our own stories is using facts to intersect white, brown, red, LGBT and yellow communities to be included content; this broadens the importance of intersectionality.

African American Registry recently published our long-awaited article on Mark Twain. He underscored the hard truth of racism in America as one of this country's foremost writers could, Twain said ___ "The Emancipation of slavery not only freed blacks, but if freed the white man too." The next classroom phase for us is to amp up marketing this healing power source called the Teacher's Forum through the young teachers of tomorrow.






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African American Registry Expenses
