2024 THOUGHTS FROM OUR FOUNDER AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Collaboration: The year 2024 began with using our outreach coordinator's capacity-building money goal of more stability. We hired the first chief operations officer (COO) for the African American Registry. Darius Gillard from the Minnesota Opera worked for us for 6 months without much success and was let go. We've renewed and built relationships with the Coalition of Teachers of Color, We Win Institute, In Black Ink, 825 Arts, South Carolina State University, and others.

The Teacher's Forum: Our application for a 500 K grant to the Minnesota Humanities Center for a teacher's forum 'to preserve Minnesota culture and heritage' was denied. MHC does not fund classroom education. Currently, Concordia University of St. Paul, the University of St. Thomas St. Mary's University, and South Carolina State University teacher education deans signed letters of participation. Our intent is to serve outstate Minnesota and our first HBCU program. With Ethnic Studies licking in in 2026/27, we are in backroom conversations with Bobbie Burnham, of MDE as a supplement to current standards. Budget/money is the last vestige for Burnham, and Dr. Staten of SCSU.



Board Development: In 2024, we reshaped our esteemed board, letting Joe Selvaggio go and bringing on L. Burke Murphy and Nehita Onwubuya. Both women bring Millennial and Feminist career workforce experience backgrounds.

Succession: Our strategic plan timeline, which includes a 1.5-year secession plan, remains. This plan will consist of ventures in a podcast with Jonathan Marcus to start in 2025 in his next phase of steering the future of African American Registry®. In 2025, the Executive Director and webmaster are completing a state (MNHS) historical society's permanent, ongoing AAR collection. Publicizing this collection would make an attractive subscription service for a state library system (Minitex) RFP. Benjamin Mchie

In August, I traveled to Dublin, Cork, and Glengarriff Ireland, for Street Team International (STI). There, I gathered quite a bit of content. The STI theme was *Irish Asylum Seekers, and Immigrants from Africa*. I researched through video interviews with a high school student, a university professor, an immigrant counselor and community activist. I made more lifelong relationships, and the emphasis on Africana (the diaspora) philosophy was instilled in the mantra of the African American Registry while there.

Our website published Street Team International Ireland in December. The third of our yearly global study abroad connections instruct culture and history with interactive media. STI is a three-part PowerPoint video classroom exercise with a virtual study abroad concept.

The program will combine historical facts that spotlight places where African heritage thrives in countries outside the continent. Our second partnership included Int. Community Dynamics, Trinity College (Dublin), Black & Irish, and The Skibbereen Museum. In the future, STI will plan to visit Brazil, Cuba, and Israel.


